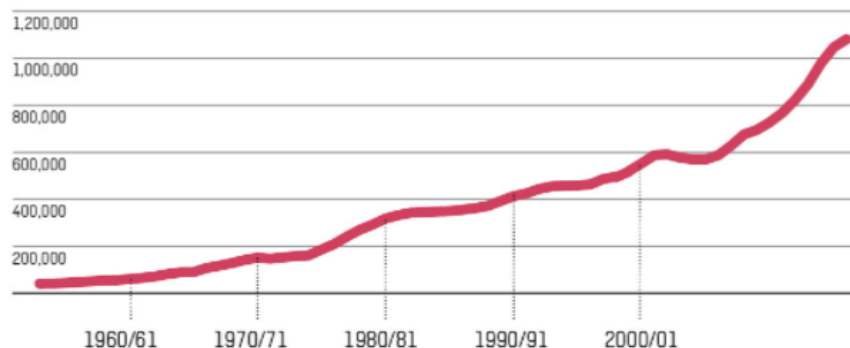

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS IN THE U.S. 1953/54 – 2016/17

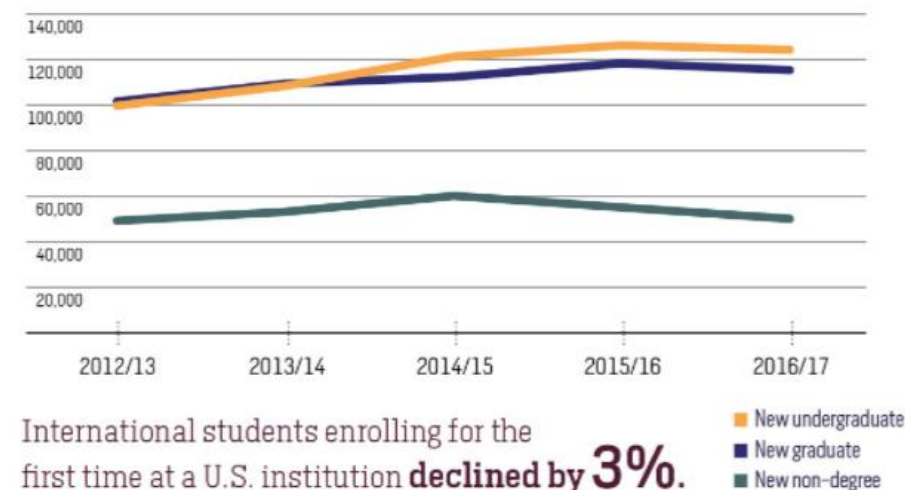


In 2016/17 there was **an increase of 3.4%** over the prior year in the number of international students in the United States.

NEWLY ENROLLING INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS IN THE U.S.

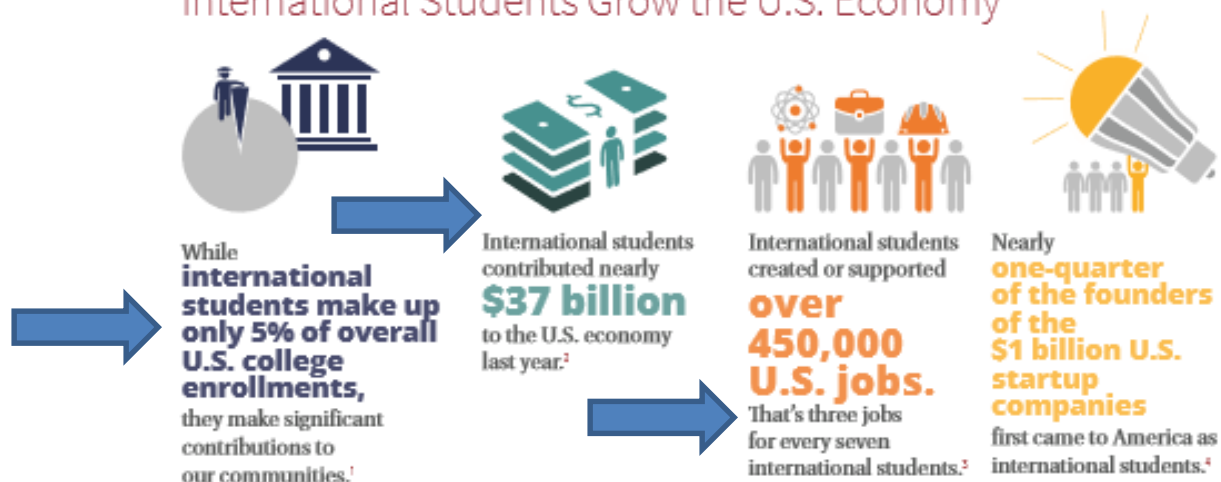


International students enrolling for the first time at a U.S. institution **declined by 3%**.

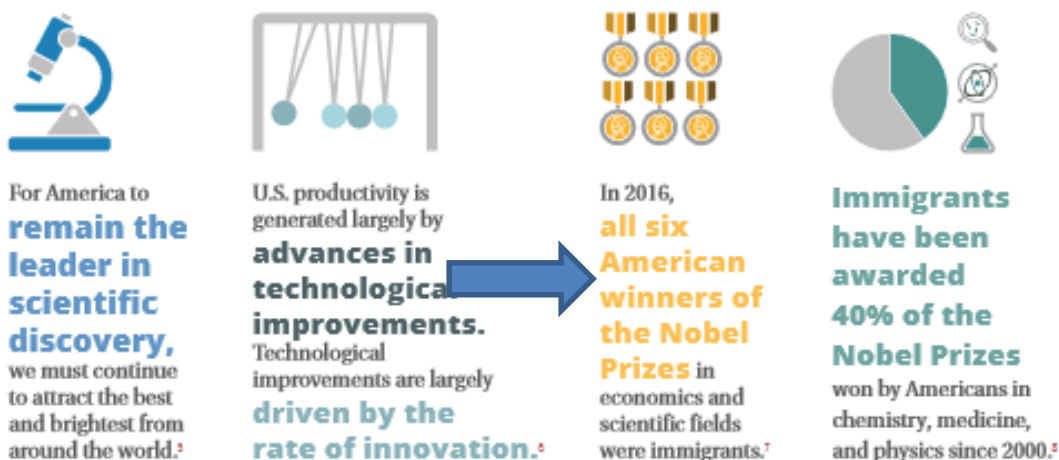

A quality education is a global education. Unfortunately, too many students are graduating college without the global skills needed to thrive in the global economy. We know that over 80% of college freshmen want to study abroad, yet only 10% of students study abroad before they graduate, and minority students are greatly underrepresented within those numbers. The Simon Program provides a path to correct this imbalance.

- Four Goals:
 - Increase the number of U.S. college students studying abroad for credit to 1 million students annually;
 - Ensure the diversity of study abroad participants reflects the U.S. undergraduate population;
 - Significantly increase the proportion of study abroad that occurs in nontraditional destinations outside of Western Europe;
 - Make study abroad an integral part of U.S. higher education.
